

The Community Services Department is responsible for the provision of services for residents and businesses related to parks, recreation, culture, and corporate communications.





Culture Division

The culture division strives to preserve, research, interpret and exhibit items that will serve to illustrate and promote the history and prehistory of the municipality and the Lake Scugog Area. Our division is responsible for showcasing vibrant historical museums, places and stories that engage our community and providing each resident and visitor with a better understanding of Scugog and rural Ontario history and our First Nation Heritage.

The Scugog Shores Museum Village is open from Victoria Day weekend to Labour Day weekend, Wednesdays to Sundays. The Village shows what daily life was like in Scugog from the mid to late 1800's. It includes 11 restored buildings, heritage flower, herb and vegetable gardens, and Ojibway Heritage Interpretive Lands. It is also the site for many special events, school and educational programs, and rentals.





Recreation Division


The recreation division is responsible for supporting the provision of safe and sustainable leisure activities that promote opportunities for all community members to experience and achieve the physical, emotional, and social benefits of leisure. Our division contributes to community cohesiveness and pride through participation in leisure. Programs offered include recreation programs for pre-schoolers, children, youth, adults and seniors, summer, winter break and PA day camps, and aquatic programming. Drop-in programs include pickleball, public skating and swimming, parent and tot skating, shinny, and stick and puck. Our programs are coordinated by the Recreation and Culture Coordinator and Recreation Programmer and delivered by over 15 recreation student staff and partnerships that include EarlyON, Ashlea Jones Athletes in Training, Scugog Arts, and Port Perry Tennis Club.



Other initiatives the recreation division participated in:

- Initiated more inclusive youth programming, including LGBTQS2+ lookout night and family skate
- Upgraded leadership programs to Red Cross certified programs
- Created the Summer and Winter leisure guide in-house
- Created the "Gold Coin Contest" in March for public skating
- Supervised the operation of the ice oval
- Created Tik Toks for Recreation









Communications Division

Our communications team is responsible for overseeing corporate communications for the Township, which span across digital, traditional, and print media. These include websites (scugog.ca, my.scugog.ca, scugogtourism.ca), social media (Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, TikTok, LinkedIn, YouTube), newspaper/magazine ads, radio and earned media with both print and television. All messages from posts to news releases from all departments go through the communications team. Throughout 2022, we released 168 news items on scugog.ca, 2,600 total social media posts across the main three channels (1,100 on Facebook, 917 on Twitter, 554 on Instagram) - 717 more than in 2021 averaging a reach of 16,200 per post on Facebook alone – an increase from 12,200 the previous year. TikTok was an especially notable success for the communications and recreation teams, boasting hundreds of thousands of views, 141,000 likes and 763 followers. In addition to Township-specific posts, we also share posts from other organizations when applicable to our community. Some of these posts include Durham Region content like Durham Greener Homes, transit, social services, Durham Regional Police Services community outreach survey and releases, 311 Information, capital projects impacting Scugog and more.

There were several initiatives that required tailored communications plans, spanning across multiple departments. Some of these included Budget, 2022 Municipal Election, Corporate Strategic Plan, Recreation, IT Strategic Plan, Fire and Emergency Services public education and prevention and Public Works capital projects. Each of these communications plans included a myriad of tactics that were measurable and served to inform and engage the community. Additional tactics included digital options, content spanning across multiple websites and often in-person outreach opportunities for stakeholders and the public.

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




8,796 site visits My Scugog, Our Community Engagement Site







Parks Division

Parks division is responsible to provide safe, well maintained municipal green space for all residents and visitors. Our division is responsible the operation and maintenance of 19 parks, 16 playgrounds, 12 ball diamonds, six tennis courts,3 basketball courts, 3 skateparks, 10 km of municipal trails, 15 gardens, 92 hanging baskets and the splashpad. During the winter, the division is responsible for maintenance of 25 km of sidewalks and 16 parking lots.


